The marvellous thing about human beings is that everyone has a special talent, something unique, which only that person can contribute to the world. If we think of the talents which people around us have, instead of thinking



THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 15th November 2020



Jesus said to his disciples, "There was once a man who set out on a journey. Before he left, he summoned his servants and handed over his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two talents, and to a third he gave one talent

- giving to each according to their ability. Then he left on his journey. After a long time the master came back and settled his accounts with them. The servant who had received the five talents brought his master an extra five talents. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with five talents; look, I've made you another five talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant; you have proved yourself faithful over little things, so I will put you in charge of much more. Come and share your master's joy.' The servant who had been given two talents made two more and his master said the same thing to him. But the servant who had been given one talent had just buried it in the ground and then dug it up and returned it to his master. The master was angry and had that lazy servant thrown out."

Wednesday's TALENT

"Life is a talent entrusted to us so that we can transform it and increase it, making it a gift to others." Pope St John Paul II

Ask your child what the word 'talent' means to them. Everybody has some God-given gifts or talents. They might not be as obvious as being good at sport, or acting, or singing, but they are just as valuable and please God greatly (e.g. helping out someone who is new to school, being able to cheer people up, or simply being a patient listener or a good friend). As a family, name each other's special talents. Each of you say which talent you are especially grateful to God for.

When we share our individual talents, our families and communities are enriched. Each of you talk about a talent that you admire in a friend, a teacher or someone in your community who uses their talents well - to serve God and help others. Is there a talent you would like to develop? Who could you ask to help you? In this coming week, how could you use your talents to show your love for God and for the good of others at home, at school or in the community?

Dear Lord Jesus, help us to develop our talents and to know how we can use them for the good of others in this coming week. Amen.
