All children have also been invited to create a photo to share on a special video to celebrate World Week.

SAFER INTERNET DAY

We will be celebrating Safer Internet Day on Tuesday 9th February 2021. The theme for this year is 'An internet we trust: exploring reliability in the online world'. The internet has an amazing range of information and opportunities online, as well as the potential to inform, connect and inspire us but how do we separate fact from fiction? Children will be exploring how to decide what they should trust online. We know that the issues of misinformation and 'fake news' do not solely affect young people, but that these issues do have a great impact on how young people feel about their time online. The aim of this year's Safer Internet Day is to help equip young people with the skills they need to spot inaccurate content, which can sometimes be a complex task. Once young people feel more comfortable separating fact from fiction it is important that we then help them to take the next steps in helping to create an internet full of trustworthy and reliable information.
